

The impact of hand eczema



Hand eczema, or hand dermatitis, describes any type of eczema that develops on the hands. It is often job-related and can be worsened by frequent hand washing and chemical exposure. Hand eczema may also be part of atopic dermatitis or occur alongside eczema on other parts of the body. The condition can cause itchy, dry, scaly skin that cracks and flakes. Hand eczema may require specific testing and treatment. It can be mild, moderate, or severe, and in more severe cases, it can be extremely painful. The impact on quality of life can be profound. - Hand eczema is common among health care workers, hairdressers, mechanics, and florists – jobs that involve frequent hand use or handwashing.
